

BLACKJACK HANDOUT SIX

- **Approval Calls** are mandatory calls designed to keep the Supervisor informed of activities on the games. Approval calls require Supervisor approval BEFORE the action is executed.

Approval Calls are as follows;

"Shuffle" then "Roll"
"Change" [REDACTED] or more
"Cheque Change" [REDACTED] or more or with Black
One call before bringing in and another before sending out
"Color Up" ([REDACTED] or more)
One call before bringing in and another before sending out
"Cheques Play [REDACTED] or more
"Pay or Take to the Limit"
"Black Action" and above
"Card Down"
"Cheque Down"
"Marker Requested"
"Dealer Cuts"
"Double Down on a Breaking Hand"
"Double Down on Blackjack"

- **Alert Calls** are important to keep your Supervisor informed but they do not require you to wait for approval before proceeding.

Alert Calls are as follows;

"Change" under [REDACTED]
"Cheque Change" over or under [REDACTED]
"Color Up" (over or under [REDACTED].)
"Dealer Cuts"
"Double Down for Less"
"Even Money"
"Insurance"

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
