

Rack management:

The Basics: (all table game)

A full stack is 20

The clear place disk is called a spacer

Each row in the Rack is called a tube.

When you break a stack of 20 you must start using spaces in the shortened stack when they are black and up.

Spacer needed on less than 20 by color	
Black cheques are spaced every 5	Yellow cheques are spaced every 5
Purple cheques are spaced every 4	Brown cheques are spaced every 4

Each game has its own rules and differences for rack management.

Black Jack: Blackjack works from outside in

Your Rack in Blackjack will have more \$5 and \$25 cheques than on other table game and in most cases will not have cheques over \$500. This is because Blackjack has lower minimum required.

Starting tables will most likely have \$10 or \$15 minimum

In blackjack we work from the outside in keeping the highest cheques in the center tubes.

This means when you are paying a bet that uses the left hand you will use the left outer tubes and when you pay a bet with the right hand you will use the right outer tubes.

Standard rack should be two or three rows of red on right and left followed by a row or two of green and a row of black on each side with row of purple in the middle. Total will depend on table limits

Pai Gow: Pai Gow works from right to left.

Working from right to left requires you to keep the cheques on the right side of the rack at full stacks and work from the ones on the left.

As the stacks on the left become empty you will move only full stacks from the outer right to the working left.

Most starting Pai Gow tables will have a table minimum of \$25 so most tables will have no cheques higher than \$500

Baccarat: Baccarat works from right to left just like Pai Gow.

Depending on the type of Baccarat you deal you will have different higher value checks

Baccarat will have fewer cheques \$5 and under as the table base on all three (easy, mini, midi) all have a minimum bet of \$25

Easy Baccarat will most likely have no cheques higher than \$500, Mini \$1000 and Midi may have \$5000

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
